# THE CHRISTIAN CREED

There's a clever scene in the film Unbreakable. Bruce Willis gets onto a train and settles into a seat by the window. A few moments later, a woman comes into the carriage and sits near him. She's young and beautiful and he catches her eye. And then the camera focuses on his hands. You see him turning his wedding ring, pulling it off his finger, and hiding it in his pocket.



Without using any words, it says everything. The ring is a symbol of his marriage, and he knows that; and he knows that others will know that to, which is why he wants to conceal it.

It reminds me of another film called Silence by Martin Scorsese. This tells the true story of Christianity in seventeenth century Japan. The Japanese Catholics would often keep a religious picture in their homes: perhaps an image of Jesus on the Cross, or the Virgin Mary.

When the government started to persecute Christianity, they needed a way of identifying those who were Christian. They'd gather people in the village square; put on of these Christian images on the ground; and tell villagers to step on it. If someone refused, it showed they were willing to stand up for their faith.

Now you might say these are just symbols: a wedding ring, a Christian image. But symbols are important. They help us to see what someone believes and what they care about.

One of the most important symbols of Christian faith is the creed. A creed is a written summary of what Christians believe. Jesus said "the truth will set you free", and the creed presents the central truths of Christian teaching.

It's the whole amazing adventure of faith, from before creation until the end of time, squeezed into just a few lines, with the death and Resurrection of Jesus Christ at the very centre. In itself, the creed is tiny, but it's like a crystal that reflects the light of a million suns, or a data stick that contains a code to unlock the mysteries of the universe.

There are different versions of the creed. The Nicene Creed is incredibly old. It goes back tot hew fourth century. In the British Museum there is an ancient copy of this creed written by hand in Egypt about 1,500 years ago.

The Apostles' Creed is even older. It goes back nearly 2000 years to the Christian community in 2nd century Rome. It sums up the teaching of Jesus and the teaching of the whole Bible in just a few words. It gives you a direct connection with the faith of the early Church.

We all have our own story to tell, our faith is incredibly personal. But it's not just a personal story. Through baptism we become part of something much bigger than ourselves.

### **FEAST DAYS THIS WEEK**

**29th July - Memoria of St Martha, St Mary & St Lazarus** - These three siblings lived in Bethany, just outside Jerusalem, and were friends of Jesus. On one visit, Jesus had Mary sitting at his feet and listening to him when Martha complained that she was not helping her to prepare the meal. Jesus chided Martha, telling her that her sister 'had chosen the better part'. Later, we hear the graphic account of Jesus raising Lazarus from the dead to the delight of the two sisters. In 2023 Pope Francis decreed that henceforth the three siblings should share their feast day today.

**31st July - Memoria of St Ignatius of Loyola** - St Ignatius of Loyola was born in the Basque country of northern Spain in 1491. Ignatius became a soldier and was seriously injured in battle at Pamplona in 1521. It was during his long recuperation that he received the grace of spiritual conversion. He read about the lives of Christ and the saints and realised their worth, compared to the lives of so many people like himself. Such 'discernment of spirits' became an essential element in his Spiritual Exercises, composed 1522-1524. Later, at the University of Paris, he and five fellow students took religious vows (the first step in founding the Society of Jesus); in 1539 a special vow was added of total obedience to the pope. Ignatius in Rome led the new order. It became a key element in the Counter Reformation and still remains pertinent in the education of the young, in foreign missions, in charitable work, in scholarship. He died in 1556. He is the patron saint of spiritual retreats and soldiers.

1st August - St Alphonsus Ligouri - St Alphonsus Mary de Ligouri was born near Naples in 1696 and was talented in the arts of music, painting and poetry, his first choice of career was law but, aged 27, he decided to be a priest. He worked among homeless youth in Naples and in nearby rural areas, became known as a preacher with a simple and direct style and as a confessor who, although opposing moral laxity, rejected rigorist attitudes, such as Jansenism. In 1732 he founded the Redemptorist Order and in 1762 he was made bishop of the see of Sant' Agata de' Goti. He had a special devotion to Mary, particularly under the title of 'Our Lady of Perpetual Help'. Due to ill-health and difficulties for his active work, he resigned from the diocese in 1775 and returned to private life in his order. He died in 1787 and is the patron of moral theologians.
